Introduction to Committee

WAMUNC is canceled. After a sudden change of heart by the University, all bookings, registrations, and preparations for WAMUNC have been revoked and the conference has been put on ice. With only 2 weeks remaining until the scheduled time, the Secretariat has yet to make an announcement to all of the competing schools about the current predicament, with the hope that a new arrangement can be reached within that time to keep the conference running as planned. Of course, it's impossible for everything to go exactly as it was, and some sacrifices will need to be made, but WAMUNC must continue in some form in 2024. Delegates will be tasked with taking on the roles of real secretariat members and using their expertise to scratch together a WAMUNC experience that is as fun, enriching, and educational as it was initially planned to be.

Committee Background

Without much warning, and lacking a suitable explanation, the school suddenly canceled WAMUNC XXVI only 3 weeks before the conference was scheduled to occur. In the week since, the news has spread to numerous staffers and members of leadership, who have taken the opportunity to drop out of their commitments and fill the initially scheduled slot with other activities. After a week of what can only be described as complete chaos, an Emergency Secretariat has been formed to solve the problem, featuring the original 12 members along with auxiliary members of the George Washington International Affairs Society, WAMUNC's parent organization. With 2 weeks remaining until the scheduled date of the conference, school newspapers and media outlets have gotten ahold of the story regarding the cancellation, and the Emergency Secretariat must work against the clock to ensure that a backup plan is developed and implemented before the information is released to the public. WAMUNC's long and prestigious history is one of perseverance, through pandemics and financial hardships, and the Secretariat is committed to making sure that this most recent setback won't be the blow that ends up scarring the conference forever. Your move, delegates.

The most concerning aspect of the cancellation is how suddenly it occurred. GW has given no official explanation, and previous attempts to receive comment from them have netted vague, political responses that don't answer the question. While members of the Emergency Secretariat would no doubt feel more confident and comfortable knowing the true cause and reason for the cancellation of the conference that they've worked so hard on, it seems unlikely that this reason will be given up so easily. Cancellations such as this are unprecedented in the history of the conference, and there is much speculation as to why this specific instance of WAMUNC was targeted as opposed to the other 25 iterations that have come before, but some are speculating that the reason could go much deeper than a simple scheduling conflict. Finding out the true motive will be the prerogative of delegates, whether or not they choose to is up to them, but there may be a deeper story to uncover.

Since its inception at the turn of the century, WAMUNC has always strived to provide a fun, engaging, and educational experience to students all over the United States and even the world. Combined with a trip to Washington DC, our nation's capital, WAMUNC has always been a conference enjoyed by students and teachers alike for a variety of reasons. The conference has survived through economic recessions and pandemics, always finding a way to pick itself back up and ensure an experience that delegates would be excited to have. The biggest threat to WAMUNC, ironically, came only four years ago, with the outset of the COVID-19 Pandemic and the shutdown of in-person activities on GW's campus. Being forced to go online for two iterations was something that neither party, the organizers or the delegates, would have found preferable, but in the long term, the virtual conferences were smash successes that allowed for future expansion and the continuation of WAMUNC as an event. One of the main differences between the COVID-19 Pandemic and now, however, is that options for the conference were extremely limited. With every conceivable corner of daily life being forced online, WAMUNC wasn't looked at as an outlier or a failure, simply as an event doing what so many others were doing to adapt to the situation and survive. This is no longer the case, and WAMUNC's most recent cancellation can't be extended to society as a whole, forcing those on both the administrative and competitive ends of the equation to consider other alternatives and competitors could potentially arise in its place.

Committee Topics

Finding Staffers

Unsurprisingly, college kids are a busy bunch of people. As much as we'd love to assume that every single staffer has their job locked in on their calendar, scheduling their life around it and freeing up ample time, we also need to acknowledge that this can't always be the case. GW is a place with lots to do, and given the opportunity, you can't put it past many of the staffers who believed that the conference was canceled to find something else to take up their time. Staffers have filled their now-vacant timeslot with classwork, other clubs or organizations, internships, jobs, sports games, and just about anything else you can think of. WAMUNC can't be run without an ample number of well-trained staff, so the Emergency Secretariat will need to put in a large amount of effort to make sure that you can find enough people in time. Whether it be bringing back old staffers, finding new ones, or maybe even coming up with a way to make a third, less typical option work, this should be one of the first actions taken to make sure that the groundwork for a successful conference can even be laid in the first place.

Finding a Host Location

Not only has the school canceled WAMUNC's room reservations on campus, but they've already allowed other student organizations to eat up the space that was once reserved to put on the conference. From an existential standpoint, this is probably the biggest threat that WAMUNC and its Emergency Secretariat are facing. The conference is expecting hundreds of delegates to participate, and if they can't find anywhere to put them, how is everything going to operate? Other options, ones that aren't dependent on the school's whim, are available, such as hotel contracts and other public spaces, but the Emergency Secretariat would need to find the

resources to pull them through. Desperate times call for desperate measures, and there is some talk of even forcing the conference online, similar to how it was done during the COVID-19 pandemic. This is a last resort, however, and the Emergency Secretariat should examine every possible location to host the conference, no matter how infeasible or absurd it may seem. Washington, DC has a lot of public spaces, and they may soon have eyes turned to them by a creative, yet desperate, secretariat.

Public Relations and Outreach

While no official statements have been made to participating schools or delegates yet, there are sure to be some questions asked when the date of the conference comes around and major parts of the initial organization of the conference are drastically different. Keeping confidence in the conference is imperative to ensure that not only do schools decide to compete at this iteration of WAMUNC, but they continue to do so in the future. This secretariat must come up with an official reason for the forthcoming changes, one that's satisfactory on both the organizational side and the delegate experience side. Without the school, WAMUNC would not be possible, so care is needed not to shift too much blame or make them upset, for fear of future retaliation and the inability to host successful WAMUNC conferences in the coming years. The messaging must toe a fine line that doesn't place blame on one group more than the others, as well as appease the curiosity of those participating in the conference who might ask questions.

Expansion

Although the immediate issue that needs to be addressed by this Secretariat is ensuring that the conference can occur at all this year, the prospect of additional growth and expansion for the future must always be considered. After all, if WAMUNC is held, yet its growth is stunted and

reputation ruined, only to contract and fizzle out in the future, were the efforts of this committee really a success? You will have to answer many other questions during the course of this committee, such as the ones outlined above, and they give you plenty of options for expansion if executed well. If you decide to find a new host location for the conference, for instance, and it allows you to expand WAMUNC beyond simply Model UN, that can be taken advantage of to facilitate future expansion. As large as it may seem, Model UN is a relatively niche topic, and the conference could be taken to another level at both a regional and national level if expansion is considered through unique, out of the box ideas that could even potentially leave behind the limitations that WAMUNC currently has set for itself.

Future Safeguards and Backup Plans

Think about it, do you delegates really want to be sitting here next year dealing with the exact same situation as you have now? To secure WAMUNC for the future, there needs to be more robust backup plans and safeguards to ensure that the same drama that's currently occurring won't happen in the future. While we don't know the true reason for WAMUNC's cancellation of GW property, we know that it could be absolutely devastating should it happen again. While this Emergency Secretariat is hoping to pull out a miracle and have WAMUNC run smoothly in some form, lightning doesn't strike twice. If this same situation happens later down the line, there's no guarantee that an Emergency Secretariat would even be able to be formed, let alone take appropriate action to solve the issue. We don't need a twenty-layer deep failsafe, but what we do need is some form of insurance for the conference so that these same circumstances don't repeat themselves for future iterations of the conference.
